APGRD Postdoctoral Research Associates



Justine McConnell is a postdoctoral Research Associate at the APGRD, working on the 'Performing Epic' project. The project is documenting and examining versions of Graeco-Roman epic performed in any medium and language, from antiquity to the modern day, around the world. In 2010-2011 Justine was a Mellon Postdoctoral Fellow in Classics at Northwestern University, teaching on Classics and cinema, and working on the 'Classicizing Chicago' project, which investigates Chicago's engagement with the classical world. Justine has a background in both English Literature and Classics; her book, which developed out of her doctorate supervised by Edith Hall at Royal Holloway, is on postcolonial responses to the *Odyssey*, and is under contract to OUP. She is coeditor of *Ancient Slavery and Abolition: from Hobbes to Hollywood* (OUP, 2011) with Edith Hall and Richard Alston, and of a forthcoming OUP volume, *The Oxford Handbook of Greek Drama in the Americas*, with Kathryn Bosher, Fiona Macintosh, and Patrice Rankine.



Cécile Dudouyt is a post-doctoral Research Associate at the APGRD working on 'French Translations of Greek and Roman Drama', the first stage of a wider APGRD research project on translations of ancient drama in European vernaculars from the Renaissance onwards. In 2009, she completed her DPhil thesis, 'Sophoclean Revenge: Renaissance and Enlightenment Re-writings', conducted under a joint supervision agreement between Oxford University (Classics Faculty) and the Département d'Etudes Anglophones in l'Université de Paris 10 (supervisors: Fiona Macintosh and Ann Lecercle). This was followed by an Agrégation in English in 2010. She has translated numerous articles both from French to English and from English to French, as well as, most recently, Ann Jefferson's book on the impact of life-writing on theories of French literature, *La Biographie*, *ou la littérature en question* (PUF, forthcoming). She is also writing on Freud's engagement with Sophoclean and Shakespearean drama for an edition of Plon's Dictionary Series.
