## 2. Alice Oswald elected new Professor of Poetry



We are especially delighted that Alice Oswald has been elected Oxford Professor of Poetry - the first ever woman to hold the post. She has been an Associate Artist of the APGRD for a number of years, and it is wonderful that she is now regularly in Oxford. Alice is a very welcome member of the Greek Lyric Translation Workshop, led by Xavier Buxton and attended by many APGRD doctoral and postdoctoral students (and Oliver Taplin). She is also joining us this year in the organisation (together with Marina Warner, Justine McConnell and Sue Jones, director of DANSOX) of a large-scale, overnight series of performances of epic from 8pm on 30 April until 6am on May morning in the Jacqueline du Pré Music Building, St Hilda's College (see the list of artists performing below).

#### 3. Giulia Fiore (University of Bologna, APGRD Erasmus intern)

'Thanks to the Erasmus+ Traineeship programme, I have spent three months at the APGRD volunteering as an archivist-assistant. I worked alongside Claire Kenward and Claire Barnes who trained me in the cataloguing, curation, and preservation of archive material as well as maintaining the online database. I had the pleasure to act as a tester during the final stages of the APGRD's multimedia ebook *Agamemnon, a performance history*. I also had the opportunity to collaborate with Dr Giovanna Di Martino on her project creating a digital collection of early modern European drama, both in Latin and in the vernacular. The work on Renaissance materials has helped with my own PhD project on the early modern reception of Greek tragedy.'



### 4. APGRD Postgraduate Symposium: Celebrating 20 years, 2-3 July 2020

This year is the 20<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the APGRD/University of London's two-day Joint Postgraduate Symposium on the Performance of Ancient Drama, which annually brings together around 50 postgraduates and early career scholars from around the world. This year the theme is 'Performing the archive in the Theory and Practice of Greek and Roman Drama' and we are delighted to welcome back two distinguished alumnae: Dr Avery Willis, who was an Oxford doctoral organiser at the first meeting in 2000 and is now a theatre director, producer and currently Program Director at the Park Avenue Armory, NYC;

# 1. Chorus in the 21st century

This week-long workshop in September 2019 culminated in a lecture/performance of danced explorations of the first stasimon of Euripides' *Medea*. Led by: Marie-Louise Crawley (Choreographer), Struan Leslie (Dramaturg and Movement Director), Malcolm Atkins (Composer). Three of the participants, Marcus Bell, Alison Middleton and Estelle Baudou, share their memories:

I can see the women of Corinth: 'Through dancing improvisations, we first built a collective body before embodying any character.'

**Text as tattoos:** 'The difference between how the Greek and the English etched themselves onto or into us, and how they could be seen and felt in our bodies was striking.'



We are not working on Medea any more: 'After three days, our chorus had its own experiences, its own past, even its own vocabulary... We were not acting Euripides' chorus but building something new that was our own. Experiencing the dancing chorus together was suddenly more powerful than the text itself.'

### 2. Performing Early Modern translations workshop




The workshop was presented at the Maison Française d'Oxford, 29 November 2019, at the end of the APGRD/Grenoble/Paris 13 conference 'On Translating Greek Drama in Early Modern Europe'. Led by director, Estelle Baudou (APGRD Marie-Curie Research Fellow), with Giovanna Di Martino (Lecturer at St Anne's College, Oxford) as dramaturg and the following participants: Marcus Bell, Fanny Bloc, Annaïg Briand, Giovanna Casali, Marie-Gabrielle Pélissié Du Rausas and Marchella Ward.

Estelle writes: 'The workshop's objective was to question the theatricality of three 16<sup>th</sup>-century translations of Euripides' *Iphigenia at Aulis* in French, Italian and English: *L'Iphigène* by Tomas Sébillet, *Ifigenia* by Lodovico Dolce, and *Iphigenia at Aulis* by Jane Lumley. As we attempted to build a multilingual

chorus using the tragedy's last stasimon, we realized that these translations were not telling the same story: the French version highlighted Iphigenia's glory, the English the military ritual of Iphigenia's sacrifice, whereas the Latin and the Italian texts (supposedly the former functioned as crib for the latter) were looking ahead and expressed mourning.'

# 3. Seamus Heaney and the Classics: Bann Valley Muses

Edited by Stephen Harrison, Fiona Macintosh and Helen Eastman (Oxford University Press), this latest APGRD volume was launched in November 2019 with Catherine Heaney, many of the contributors and friends in the audience. 


#### 1.Book launch and ebook showcase
