The Actors of Dionysus turn 25

The APGRD recently received a collection documenting 25 years of productions by the Actors of Dionysus. The company was founded in 1993 and has created over 50 productions of Greek plays, touring them nationally and internationally to over 750,000 people. To mark the occasion the APGRD will host an event with the AOD, with discussion and performances, on Monday 12 November at 5pm in the Lecture Theatre, Ioannou Centre.



APGRD Artist in Residence



Between January and June 2017, choreographer and dance artist Marie-Louise Crawley was Artist-in-Residence at the APGRD. During the residency, Marie-Louise developed a solo, masked, site-specific dance piece inspired by ancient pantomime. The piece, *Likely Terpsichore? (Fragments)* was created for the gallery spaces in the Ashmolean Museum, and based on four female figures from Ovid's narrative poem, the *Metamorphoses* – Galatea, Myrrha, Philomel and Medusa. The piece has recently been performed over a number of days at the Ashmolean Museum, and a film version has now been completed and will shortly be available via our website.

The APGRD blog

APGRD graduate students and researchers continue to contribute to the blog. The 'Archive in 100 Objects Project' (which includes discussions of letters, tickets, production diaries and posters) is on-going, and is now joined by guest blog posts on subjects such as Nigerian adaptations of Sophocles' *Oedipus Tyrannus*, Sir Edward German's lost music for Sophocles' *Antigone* and the role of the mask in modern productions of ancient drama. 
