APGRD DATABASE GOES ONLINE

The APGRD Database has now been published on our website. It is now possible to search over 8250 productions drawing on ancient Greek and Roman drama which have been performed internationally on stage, screen, and radio from the Renaissance to the modern day. Currently available are over 5000 records for productions drawing on Greek tragedy; a further 3500 records will be added over the next few months for Greek comedy and Roman drama. The Database has a flexible search facility, and production records can be viewed individually in detail, or in an overview report format. The Database also aims to provide, where possible, a range of bibliographical references as sources of information on each production (for example, newspaper reviews, academic publications, actors' biographies, and websites).

It is hoped that the APGRD Database will function as a map, outlining the terrain and pointing researchers in interesting directions, as well as providing basic information on productions. The data it holds is not static: individual records are constantly being revised and expanded and new records are added as more information comes to light. Further information on productions of ancient drama, both new and those already recorded, is always most welcome.

NEW FIVE-YEAR AHRC GRANT:

'THE PERFORMANCE RECEPTION OF GREEK & ROMAN PLAYS'

The APGRD is engaged in a new phase of research under the title 'The Performance Reception of Greek and Roman Plays' until October 2009, which has been made possible by the award of a major fiveyear grant from the Arts and Humanities Research Board (now Council). The project will (i) develop theoretical models for the scholarly practice of performance reception; (ii) collect all the information that can be discovered about identifiable performances in antiquity; and (iii) turn to further kinds of performance and interpretation in the modern period, particularly opera and dance, thus moving beyond the range already covered by the APGRD.

We are especially pleased to welcome onto the APGRD team Rosie Wyles, who is funded by the project to pursue doctoral research on performance reception in antiquity under the supervision of Edith Hall at the Department of Classics and Ancient History, University of Durham. Rosie graduated from St Anne's College, Oxford in 2004. She is now in the first year of her PhD and has recently given a paper on the theatrical reception of Euripides' *Andromeda* (AMPAH 2005). Her special interest is in theatre costume.
