Eco warriors and bird poo... Aristophanes' Birds for kids

The Onassis Programme is proud to have commissioned *Cloudcuckooland*, a new musical for ages 7+ based on Aristophanes' *Birds*, with book and lyrics by Stephen Sharkey and music by Alex Silverman. The show will open in Oxford for six performances from 13 February, then tour to Hammersmith, Belfast, Newcastle, Bridgwater, Newport, Sheffield, Brighton, Armagh, Sutton and Greenwich until 27 April. It is performed by seven actor musicians (who play more instruments between them than you would think possible). This modern adaptation contains lots of slapstick, clowning, juggling, ludicrous big bird costumes and a healthy dollop of political satire. 8TH ANNUAL RHUL/APGRD POSTGRADUATE SYMPOSIUM: 'VIOLENCE' 17-18 JUNE 2008

The 8th Annual Postgraduate Symposium, organised by the Department of Drama & Theatre, Royal Holloway, University of London, and the APGRD, will take place on Tuesday 17 June at the Classics Centre, Oxford and on Wednesday 18 June 2008 at Royal Holloway, Egham. The Symposium focuses on the reception of ancient Greek drama, emphasizing the vivid afterlife of the dramatic texts through the revisitings of ancient tragedy and comedy by academics, playwrights and practitioners. This year's Symposium will focus on the theme of violence. The deadline for the call for papers is 28 March 2008. FRAM

ROYAL NATIONAL THEATRE, LONDON, 10 APRIL - 22 MAY 2008

Fram is a major new work by Tony Harrison, whose many plays include *The Oresteia, The Trackers of Oxyrhynchus* and *Hecuba*. The epic sweep of this play takes us from a contemporary Westminster Abbey to the Arctic ship Fram – or Forward – specially built by the famous Norwegian explorer Fridtjof Nansen who with his suicidal companion Johansen makes a bid on foot for the North Pole in the 1890s. Though incompatible, they share a bear fur sleeping-bag through the long winter. Nansen, still haunted by Johansen's ghost, is appointed to the League of Nations. As a figurehead of Russian famine relief in 1922, he conducts the first celebrity campaign, searching for means, however shocking, to make people care.

RNT PLATFORM

At 6pm on 9 May 2008 Tony Harrison is joined by Edith Hall and Oliver Taplin to explore the many links between Gilbert Murray, Greek drama, the League of Nations and a large part of the current Olivier repertoire. As well as Murray being a leading character in Harrison's *Fram*, he and his wife Mary were also the inspiration for fellow-Humanist Bernard Shaw's *Major Barbara* and *Adolphus Cusins*.
